Dear Friends,

During the early summer we discovered that a family of sparrows had set up home in the outside vent of the cooker hood in the manse kitchen. With the image of a cruel landlord evicting a family out onto the street at the back of my mind, I had no option but to remove the birds. However, one of them had other ideas. On the morning of the eviction, one of the them got trapped. Rather than heading out into the fresh air, the inquisitive bird negotiated the duct and headed in to the inner workings of the cooker hood. We could hear it chirping and beating its wings. With my very limited DIY skills I realised that I might have managed to take the cooker hood apart, but getting it back together was another matter entirely. So we had to wait till somebody with experience could remove the squatting sparrow.

As we waited for the tradesman to arrive, we could hear the bird fluttering around. Then there would be silence. The silences grew longer and we were sure that the bird had not survived. However, when the cooker hood was finally taken down from the wall and dismantled we discovered that the bird had flown! The mess was still there but the bird had found its way out to freedom. We also ensured that it could not return by replacing the faulty vent cover.

For many people the past few months of lockdown have been an incredibly difficult experience. Like a sparrow trapped in a cooker hood, being confined to home, not able to go to work or socialise with friends, family and neighbours has been hard. And it has been a cruel time not being able to visit loved ones in hospital or care homes or attend funerals. To this could be added the challenge facing families of young children with them being unable to play outside with friends or attend school. But now like a sparrow finding its way into the fresh air, the lockdown is easing. Now we are able to associate, with restrictions, and we yearn to get back to our usual routines.

I am also delighted to report that the Kirk Session has agreed to reopen the church from Sunday 13th September, which means we are again able to return to worship. But like the easing of the lockdown, this comes with many restrictions. And for good reason. We have a moral responsibility to ensure that people can return to church safely and with confidence. As Covid-19 has not gone away, this is going to involve a great deal of inconvenience for all of us. More details about these arrangements are on the opposite page.

I would also like to express a sincere thank you for your ongoing support. Although Cruden Parish Church is partly supported through central funds, it exists because of the generosity of its members and supporters. This enables us to maintain a physical Christian presence of worship, mission and pastoral care. We were hoping to start a couple of new groups this year, but suspect the lockdown will continue in some form into the New Year.

In the meantime, I eagerly look forward to welcoming you back to worship on Sunday 13th September and invite you to ponder the words of Psalm 100

*Enter his gates with thanksgiving and his courts with praise;  
give thanks to him and praise his name.*

*For the Lord is good and his love endures forever;  
his faithfulness continues through all generations.*

## **REOPENING OF CRUDEN PARISH CHURCH**

**The church reopens for worship at 10.00 am, Sunday 13th September, 2020.**

In order to ensure the safety of everybody, we have put in place an enhanced cleaning and hygiene regime, which includes wiping down every 'touchable' surface with antiviral and antibacterial cleaning solution prior to the service.

There will be very limited seating, with every household maintaining a minimum distance of two metres within the building. Seating areas will be clearly marked. As seating is limited, the service will be broadcast live via the church Facebook Page.

Hand gel will be available on entry and exit from the building.

The wearing of face coverings is now compulsory in places of worship and you are encouraged to bring your own if possible. Disposable face masks will be available for those who do not have one.

To comply with the strict regulations, a track and trace system will be put in place, to record the names and phone numbers of everyone who attends.

Regretfully, no singing is allowed at this time, but Stephen will be present to play the organ.

We would request that each member and visitor fully complies with the above requirements that are either current regulations or best practice as advised by The Church of Scotland.

## 2020 London Marathon for Christian Aid Update!



On Sunday 4th October the 40th London Marathon will go ahead but only for a small number of professional elite runners. These include the current world record holder Eliud Kipchoge, who set the time of 2 hours 1 minute and 39 seconds, at the Berlin Marathon in 2018.

As many of you will be aware, I was due to represent Christian Aid at this event (and the Great North Run). However, my place on the charity team (for both events) has been held over till next year. In the meantime, I do hope to continue my fundraising efforts once the social lockdown has been further eased. To date about £2,300.00 has been sent to Christian Aid to support their work in the most impoverished and troubled places in the world. Thank you for your support.

Along with the elite event in London, the organisers are encouraging people to run their own virtual marathon on Sunday 4th October. Being up for a challenge and having done no training during the lockdown, I will also be doing the equivalent distance. (After church of course!) I will probably be walking most of the way, whilst attempting to work off the spare tyre I have gained during the lockdown!

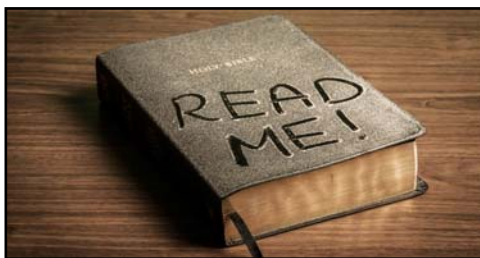

## ONE OF THE OLDEST BELLS IN SCOTLAND

We have one of the oldest surviving bells in Scotland sitting quietly in our church by the west window. It carries the date 1519 and is believed to have been cast in the Netherlands. Sadly the inscription is difficult to read and no one has yet been able to decipher it. Francis Eeles made an extensive study of the bells of Aberdeenshire and when he visited Cruden at the end of the 19th century he was very enthusiastic about the bell, though noted that it was of “inferior casting, badly weathered and broken mouthed”. He urged the Kirk Session to take it down and preserve it in the church.

It was half a century before that happened! The Cruden Old Woman’s Guild presented a new bell in 1957, the 70th Anniversary of the Guild which had been started by Rev Dr Archibald Charteris in 1887. 1957 was also the 25th anniversary of first annual meeting of the Guild in the Usher Hall. That bell still hangs in the bellcote, but no longer rings. I am told that the mechanism is seized up and does not move. It was the installation of this bell that inspired Grace Cruickshank’s poem which is printed on the opposite page.

But back to the old bell. Eeles records that the bell rung with the note A, and that it is one of only three surviving mediaeval bells in Aberdeenshire. Tough Kirk’s bell once hung in the tower of King’s College in Aberdeen and dates from a time similar to the Cruden Bell. The other is to be found in the quaint double bellcote on the ruined old St Congan’s Church in Turriff. It is dated 1556. Cruden’s bell is also the fourth oldest bell in Scotland only being preceded by St Giles’ in Edinburgh (1464), St Giles’ Elgin (1502) and St John’s Perth (1506).

When Fred Coutts visited the church recently to take a picture of the old bell, he struck it to see what it sounded like. This was the sound that rung out to call the people of Cruden to church through the centuries. Wouldn’t it be wonderful to hear the sound of that old bell welcoming the congregation back to our building after our period of enforced absence?



## The Story of the Bell

This poem was written by Grace Cruickshank whose father was at one time the Beadle at Cruden Old Church.

1. I've been on top of Cruden Old for many a year, I have been told. I've worked so hard with might and main and weathered thunder, hail and rain.
2. I've watched the children as then run to Sunday School when I say come. I've heard their voices raised on high to praise their Maker in the sky.
3. In answer to my Sunday toll the people come when e're I call and sing the praises of our Lord and listen to his Holy Word.
4. The war it came to torture all and law declares I shall not toll. My tongue it lies within my cheek. My life is dull and I grow weak.
5. The news is spread so very fast: The war is o'er – Peace, Peace at last! This joyful hour is also mine once more, at last, they let me chime.
6. I've waited for this day so long and so I chime my joyful song. But mingled with the joy is pain for those who'll ne're come home again.
7. Some years ago I nearly died, for working hard, I split my side. So weak – but still I carried on. I did not think my job was done.
8. And then I hear somebody say "That bell will be removed today." A bell is here to take my place. Ah, yes, I'm really in disgrace
9. I'm taken from my home up high and on the ground, I'm made to lie. Oh woe is me, and great my sorrow for me there is no more tomorrow.
10. And then I feel those loving hands and so I learn for me there's plans. Ah yes for me there is some grace and in God's house I take my place.
11. I wish to serve my Master well but not just merely as a Bell. So if you drop a coin within I'll know to God you want to cling. To help a lame dog on the way and hope he sees a brighter day. So with me, please raise your eyes To our dear Lord beyond the skies and thank him for the life we live and every chance we have to give.







## **FAREWELL MONGOLIA**

Mission Aviation Fellowship's operation in Mongolia — known as Blue Sky Aviation — has come to an end after almost two decades.

When MAF first surveyed Mongolia after the Soviet Union collapsed in 1991, the country was less developed than it is today. With poverty widespread, the country's basic infrastructure fell into disrepair, leaving remote communities with little access to healthcare.

After 70 years of religious persecution, there were very few Mongolian Christians. The fall of communism created interest in foreign development, democracy and religious freedom.

### **A need for MAF**

As the Church slowly grew, so did calls from missionaries and NGOs for better transport. Many people were living in places that were almost impossible to reach, and the need for MAF was critical.

Following further surveys during the 1990s, MAF finally received approvals, and built a hangar in 2000. The Millennium Messenger, MAF's new Cessna Caravan aircraft designed to fly in extreme temperatures, eventually landed in Ulaanbaatar in 2001 and Blue Sky Aviation (BSA) was launched.

### **A unique service**

BSA was the first light aircraft operator in Mongolia and played a significant role in developing aviation. People living hundreds of miles from towns were able to reach them in a matter of hours — saving a week by road. The Millennium Messenger became an 'air ambulance' for remote regions, and many lives were saved. With MAF's partnership, the Gospel began to spread across the country through the work of local and international missions. From a handful of



believers in 1990, Mongolia’s Christian population has grown to almost 80,000.

**Pastures new**

By 2017, Mongolia’s infrastructure had notably improved. In recent years, young Christians have been sharing the Good News across the country. The government is increasingly taking responsibility for healthcare in remote locations, and transport routes have developed and improved. After 19 years of service, it’s time for our plane to be redeployed from Ulaanbaatar to West Africa.

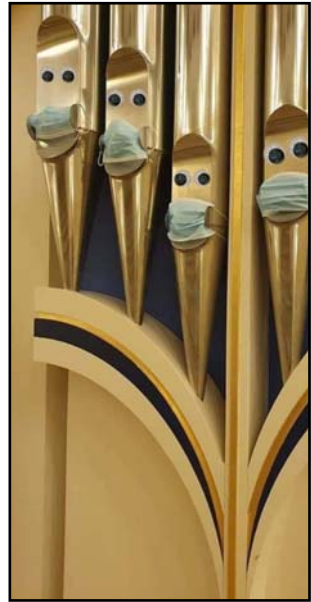
Then the choir stood to sing the anthem, which was the hymn 'Shall we gather at the river!'
