

A poem a day from Advent to Epiphany

Dear Friends

There are many different ways of viewing the festive season. When I worked in catering, Christmas was non stop. In the cooking and serving of festive fare to large numbers of customers, there was never enough time or staff. Everything felt rushed and hurried. By the time Christmas Day arrived, we were all feeling exhausted ! I think this is how many parents feel with all the things that need to be done.

Another approach is that of the cynic. Tired, exasperated people with worn out wallets and purses, wondering what is the point of all the excess!

The Christian writer C S Lewis offers an interesting insight into the true meaning of Christmas. During a radio broadcast, given at the height of the Second World War, C S Lewis spoke about the coming of Jesus into the world. This is what C S Lewis said: 'I must accept the view that He was and is God. God has landed on this enemy occupied world in human form.' For C S Lewis the meaning of Christmas could be summed up in one word, and that word would be invasion. God has invaded human experience. The coming of Jesus into the world is an act of intrusion. God is trespassing into creation. The light of God has invaded this dark work.

This is how I like to view Christmas. It is God, with subtlety and deftness, upsetting the apple cart. It is the love and the light of the Christ Child, undermining the values of this world. Through a helpless baby born into squalor and poverty, God offers a new and different way of living. And what a wonderful gift faith is! Through faith in Jesus Christ, we can know and understand and encounter the real meaning of love and grace. Faith also enables us to see the true value of things. Faith even helps us to ponder the wonder of eternity.

Going back to C S Lewis, his view that 'God has invaded this dark world' is spot on. Regretfully, the word invasion also describes the war in Ukraine perpetrated by Putin. It describes the intrusion of Hamas terrorists who committed the biggest massacre of Jewish people since the holocaust. The word invasion sums up the overreach of Israel in seeking to root out terrorists from Gaza. How these situations will be resolved is beyond me. In can be hard to find hope in such awful circumstances. But through faith, I also know that the light shines in the darkness and the darkness will not overcome it.

This Christmas time, may your homes be invaded by grace, your hearts warmed by the intrusion of God's love, and may God's light shine in the darkness.

THE CRUDEN NATIVITY PILGRIMAGE ROUTE

One of the more interesting local developments has been the formation of a new core path linking Cruden Bay with the Parish Church. The path is well used by walkers, especially Melville and Magnus (the minister's dogs).

During the festive season we will be using the core path for a Nativity Pilgrimage. Starting from the church carpark, and heading outwards towards Mill Park and returning alongside the new housing development, there will be a

series of stations. Each station will contain one or more QR codes which when scanned with a smart phone will connect with a link, offering a reading, a piece of music/ carol, a craft activity or prayer/poem. Each of these will reflect the Christmas story.

For example, the QR code on the right, if scanned into a smart phone will connect you to a recording of a well known Christmas Carol.

Burn four candles in Advent For all the people we know The Almighty watches over us We are waiting for Christmas night.



THE CRUDEN AND HATTON COMMUNITY PANTRY Update

The Cruden and Hatton Community Larder has been running for several months now from the Pavilion at Mill Park in Cruden Bay. It is a friendly, welcoming place which stocks fresh vegetables, some fruit and chilled food that would otherwise go to waste. We also have pasta, rice, cereals, tinned and frozen foods and personal hygiene products which have been donated or are bought using funds contributed by Larder users and the community.

We are staffed by volunteers who enjoy meeting our regular and new visitors. We offer visitors a cup of tea and a biscuit and a chance to sit down for a chat. There are even recipe ideas for using the food we have in stock.

We are not a food bank, but a project aiming to reduce food waste and help the community with cost of living. Some members of the community have been bringing in delicious produce from their greenhouses. If you ever grow more vegetables than you know what to do with, we'd love to see you.

We are open each Friday morning from 10:30 till 12:30. All who live in Hatton, Cruden Bay and the local surrounding area are very welcome. We ask for a minimum donation of $\pounds 2$.

MISSION AVIATION FELLOWSHIP

In late September we were visited by Mr Andy Martin of Mission Aviation Fellowship. Andy outlined the work of MAF to some of our members on the Saturday and took part in our worship on the Sunday morning. It was an eye opening experience for many.

MAF works with many charitable organisations by using light aircraft to deliver support both spiritual and physical to many living in some of the remotest areas of the world, changing the lives of those that can be reached. Using light aircraft is the quickest and safest way for aid agencies staff and supplies to reach those in need

Malaria is an illness which is having a devastating effect on millions of people living in some African countries. In 2021 there were over 690,000 deaths in the world related to malaria, 75% of these were children under the age of 5. Malaria is an easily preventable illness, vaccines are relatively inexpensive but many have little or no access to basic medical care. MAF is working with partners to deliver vaccines and other supplies to many of these remote areas allowing the population to have access to the help that they need.

Many of us will remember the famine which raged through east Africa almost 40 years ago due to drought and the work of Band Aid to help alleviate the situation. The sad fact is that today the situation is worse in that area than it was then with millions facing starvation. Again MAF is working with aid agencies to deliver food and other supplies to those in desperate need.

As a Christian organisation MAF is dedicated to changing the ending in a positive way for those in desperate need in some of the remotest locations in the world.

Polio is also an illness which is causing huge concern in certain parts of the

world. MAF is helping to combat this illness in Madagascar.

The Kirk Session have agreed to enter a partnership with MAF and hopefully this will encourage us to follow the teaching of Jesus to love others as we love ourselves.
